The 68th NALC
National Convention
was held from July
23rd—July 27th in
Minneapolis,
Minnesota.

Branch 782 was able to send eleven delegates to this biennial event. I was fortunate to be one of the delegates and would like to thank the membership for the opportunity to be a part of such a historic event that occurred.

The week consisted of morning training classes that ran from 7:30 am until 9:30am. (Think about what time we had to wake up including travel time...) The general session of the convention was from 10 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. (with no lunch time). The day concluded with more training classes which ran from 3:15 p.m. until 5:15 pm. It *WAS* a long day. *Each day on-the-clock for 9.75 hours.*

Our delegates attended classes and the general sessions each day. President Fred Rolando (pronounced Row-lan-doe) addressed the membership concerning what is happening at NALC Headquarters. They are preparing for interest arbitration on a new contract which should begin sometime in August.

They are also talking with Congress to oppose HR-2309 (The Darrel Issa Bill) if that Bill makes it to the floor. The Issa Bill is a poison pill which will lead to lost jobs, lost wages and to us being stripped of our rights to collectively bargain for our wages and benefits.

President Rolando has also been very busy rebutting all of the negative misinformation that is being put out in the media.

There were many speakers during the course of the week that addressed the membership and pledged their support towards our cause. If you would like to hear more, come to this month's general membership meeting on Tuesday August 28th.

As the delegates descended on Minneapolis, we started off with the usual morning classes offered each morning. I would have to say there was a very good variety this time around: Trustee training, legislative, Branch Secretary-Treasurer training, OWCP, City Delivery, NALC Health Benefits, MBA, Contract Administration Unit, and more.

The one really new training was a week long Steward training class. This is the one class that I think many of us took to see just what it would involve. We studied a situation which involved a removal and we went through the whole process all the way to the arbitration hearing. We did an extensive case study from the Steward's job at the first fact finding to the formal A meeting. It then featured how the DRT team and the union representatives at arbitration used the information developed by Stewards to present the case.

This class showed just how important it is to get things right all the way through the process. Just a few missed details at the original investigation could easily mean the difference between winning a case and seeing an employee removed.

I think all those in this class got the message to do your job right and honestly and the outcome will usually go your way. I did miss one session of this class to attend a FERS training class to see if there was anything new in my future for early retirement. (*No, Mike Towery I can't go yet*).

One thing did stand out at this year's convention—and *it was a very important issue!*

This issue is the urgency to fix the pre-funding obligation that is sinking the USPS.

Nothing new stopping this has been done yet; but, our NALC president is working hard to fix this problem. He needs all the support of our members to convince Congress to stop this requirement.

Thank you again for sending this delegate group to the convention. I hope we all represented our Branch well.

Yesterday I had full coverage cable company ads in my D.P.S. ...And the other day, that new local gym—Hunk O’ Body—had their flyers mailed to every address on my route! Don’t they know the gym is a waste of time? Especially on my route! I have lots of senior citizens! Nobody noticed when I ‘wasted’ several of those flyers. And these Red Plums? People just throw them away. My patrons won’t even miss them.”

The preceding conversation (in part or whole) may have passed through each one of our brains at some point in our careers as Letter Carriers. Thinking about it is one thing... But start throwing away deliverable mail, and you are asking for **BIG TROUBLE!**

Somebody or a business has paid to have their mail/flyer/circular delivered to the addressee. *IT IS NOT UP TO YOU* to determine if that mail is worthy of delivery. *An item that is addressed to “resident, occupant, etc.” is to be delivered unless the address is vacant, there is a dog hold or there is a P.O. Box delivery.*

I’m sure you have noticed the decline of first class letters. The delivery of standard rate items are job security!

You are paid by the hour and have been entrusted to deliver **ALL** deliverable mail. Fill out a 3996 form if you cannot complete your route in 8 hours. Be stern (not rude) with your supervisor if you feel that your assignment will take more than eight hours to deliver all of the mail.

Don’t exaggerate or embellish the time requested.

I’m sure this isn’t the first time you have heard this sermon.

An item that is addressed to “resident, occupant, etc.” is to be delivered unless the address is vacant, there is a dog hold or there is a P.O. Box delivery.



You may not want to hear this, but...



We were all just trying to save jobs of the working families. What really impressed me is how many retired Carriers you meet that show up to support the active Carriers now. They know how important this battle is to save Carriers' jobs. They get it. Now *WE ALL* need to get it!

Talk to other Carriers in other states and they will tell you the same things are happening all over. One Carrier did make a good point when she asked all the Carriers when was the last time they sent a card or letter in the mail. *That's* something to think about. Who doesn't like to get something nice in the mail?

We had a lot of fun on the ten shuttle rides to the convention and back sitting next to a different person from a different state every time. You would be surprised how much you can find out about someone in ten minutes. You make a lot of friends on the bus rides. It's weird how everyone I talked to knows of Bakersfield or has at least heard of it.

It was a great time there. People are friendly and the city was very clean. I learned a lot—like what a rooster sounds like at 4 a.m. I hope to go to the next convention in 2014 and learn more!





What have/will you fight for?

The recent release of Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe's "Postal Service Health Benefits and Pension Programs" and "Workforce Optimization" white papers a week before negotiations opened made it clear that letter carriers and other postal employees are in a fight.

The release of these "position papers" had a more shaking effect on me than the subsequent DC earthquake. I started reflecting on the efforts toward benefit gains that had been made in our profession just in my postal career. I wonder if the members and even non-members recognize the effect on their jobs and future if these attacks are allowed to happen.

Have you ever taken the time to consider the benefits and job protections that have been granted to most of us before we even became city letter carriers? Let's look at some of our core benefits and where they came from. The list is in the order of occurrence and, while not all-inclusive, it provides a good picture.

- **1863**—Free city delivery created the first 449 modern-era carriers.
- **1879**—Pay scales established for carriers in large cities, based upon service time (fixed at \$800 and \$1,000 per year). Smaller cities were capped at \$850 regardless of years of service.
- **1983**—Pendleton Act provided permanent status to postal employees. Prior to this, jobs were received and eliminated by the elected party of the day.
- **1884**—City letter carriers started to receive 15 days of vacation per year. Prior to this, carriers worked seven days a week, 52 weeks a year, 10 to 12 hours per day for the fixed pay.
- **1888**—The eight-hour workday became law. (The post office said this meant 56 hours per week.)
- **1889**—The National Association of Letter Carriers is organized.
- **1890**—NALC sued the Post Office Department over the eight-hour day/56-hour week mandate and won an award of \$3.5 million in 1893.
- **1912**—Mann Sunday Closing Act eliminated the seven-day week. Carriers now had one day a week off. They were still working seven days prior to this passage.
- **1916**—First Federal Employee Compensation Act created protecting carriers for the first time should they be injured at work and unable to continue working.

- **1920**—Ten days of sick leave per year granted.
- **1920**—Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) and Disability Retirement became law, which guaranteed workers a retirement.
- **1949**—Equalization of all letter carriers into same pay structure regardless of city size. Note that it took 70 years to accomplish this. (See 1879).
- **1960**—Federal Employee Health Benefit Plan (FEHBP) created. The NALC had already established its own Health Benefit Plan that year, which continues to be one of the top plans today.
- **1970**—Postal employees strike, which led to the creation of USPS. Strike was over years of pay neglect for postal employees. (Top pay salary was \$8,442.)
- **1971**—First National Agreement provided for a "no-layoff clause."
- **1983**—Federal Employee Retirement System (FERS) and Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) founded.
- **2011**—Postmaster General Patrick Donahoe initiates his "white papers" requesting the right to:
 - Lay off workers by breaking agreements in the existing contracts. (See 1971.)
 - Pull the USPS from CSRS and FERS and create a new retirement system more in line with the private sector (less benefits, more contributions from employees). (See 1920.)
 - Pull the USPS from the FEHBP and create a more private sector, less costly health benefit plan for postal employees (fewer coverage higher employee premiums). (See 1960.)
 - Eliminate 120,000 career positions and replace them with a more "flexible workforce" (part-time, low-pay, fewer-benefit workers). (Current salary for CC-1 top pay is \$56,507. See 1970 above.)

From the creation of the modern-day delivery in 1863 until the present, letter carriers have fought to achieve good pay, good benefits and a secure job. We who are the beneficiaries of those fights and actions stand in the crosshairs of an uncaring employer. We can continue to live off the fights of others or we can continue the struggle.

If you do not contribute to the protection of your job through being an e-Activist, volunteering through the Carrier Corps and contributing to COLCPE, then your future is left to someone else. Do you trust them? I do not! ☒
